



Letter from the Executive Director

DEAR MEMBER:

As the new year arrives, your generous gifts to the Historical Society this past year will keep on giving in the form of the many culturally enriching exhibitions and public programs highlighted in this newsletter. Story Barn will expand to include Bonnie Levison's workshops for budding storytellers, and *Songs of the Civil War*, canceled due to Hurricane Sandy, returns on February 3 with another exciting program of songs and narration sure to entertain the whole family.

In January we will partner with the Bruce Museum, Greenwich Tree Conservancy and Greenwich Reform Synagogue for a lecture on the science of history, featuring Neil Pederson of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory. Dr. Pederson will talk about how wood samples taken from our own Bush-Holley House helped to date changes to the house over time.



There are only a few more weeks to see and bring your friends to our special exhibition curated by Susan Larkin, *A Good Light: The Artist's Studio in Cos Cob and Beyond*, featuring 26 works of art on loan from 16 lenders, including the National Portrait Gallery, the Corcoran Gallery of Art, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The



New-York Historical Society and the Florence Griswold Museum. When visiting, you will also want to check out the expanded Studio room in Bush-Holley House. While there, be sure to ask about our new acquisition entitled, Seated Lady in a Red Dress. This evocative painting by Elmer MacRae, now on view in the Studio room, was a recent gift of Wendy Nicholson, Alison Kirk and Harold H. Webber in honor and memory of their parents, Harold and Shirley Webber, who purchased it in New York City in 1962. The painting portrays a seated woman in a red dress, leaning on her left arm, wearing a hat with a white veil that has been pulled back, and holding a pair of gloves in her left hand. MacRae gives the most attention to the ring on her left hand. While the woman was identified by Hirschl & Adler Galleries, Inc. in 1990 as MacRae's wife Constant, we cannot identify the sitter. Can you?

The Science of History:

Lecture on Tree Rings and the History They Reveal

rom the rise and fall of the Mongol Empire to the construction of buildings and boats, trees are environmental historians that can reveal events long faded from human memory and documents. In celebration of the Jewish New Year for Trees, Tu B'Shevat and to bring the lesson even closer to home, Neil Pedersen, PhD, will discuss how tree ring cores taken from Greenwich's National



Historic Landmark Bush-Holley House have helped to reveal its construction history. The event is co-sponsored by the Greenwich Historical Society, the Greenwich Tree Conservancy, the Bruce Museum and the Greenwich Reform Synagogue.


Dr. Pederson is Research Assistant Professor in the Tree Ring Laboratory at Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory, Columbia University. Pederson grew up in snowbound central New York State and spent considerable time in the Adirondack Mountains. Between his BS and MS degrees in forest ecology, he worked in the longleaf pine forests of southern Georgia, the hardwood forests of northern Vermont and the forests of Mongolia and Russia before focusing on eastern United States forests for his dissertation. He taught at Eastern Kentucky University for five years in the Department of Biological Sciences before taking his current position at Columbia. His primary research interest is the interaction between climate and forest dynamics in diverse, temperate forests, and he has initiated research on the broadleaf forests of the eastern United States, Turkey and Bhutan.

Songs of the Civil War

Rescheduled for February 3

n an afternoon of song and readings, a complement of local musicians will explore the lyrical history of the Civil War on authentic period instruments. The performance will frame each year of the War Be-

tween the States within a particular context: bravado and marching songs, camp songs, songs of home, spirituals, and songs of victory and defeat. The program was conceived and spearheaded by Stefanie Kies in collaboration with Nick Carter and Tim Schantz.

The program was originally developed by Ms. Kies in collaboration with the

Greenwich Historical Society last February. It is offered once again in co-sponsorship with Greenwich Library as part of the programming of *Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War*, an exhibition developed by the American Library Association. Story Barn Workshop and Performance

he art of personal storytelling has experienced an incredible revival in American culture as evidenced by the sellout crowds at past Story Barns performances. This year, board member and standup comedienne Bonnie Levison will be leading a personal storytelling workshop culminating in a performance on Friday, February 1, 2013. Past Story Barn themes have often tied into exhibitions here at the Historical Society. This

time around, we are opening up the field for our debut storytellers with a program entitled "Mixed Bag," honoring the diversity of our performers and the stories they have to tell.

In a three-session workshop, participants will develop and craft their personal tales. The first session will focus on principles of storytelling and individual idea development; the second session will look at developing the arc of the story; the third will consist of fine-tuning the story and developing its presentation. There will be an optional fourth session in preparation for the performance.



Multitalented Levison has been performing standup comedy and storytelling on a wide variety of stages for many years. She is a storytelling instructor for MothSHOP, the community and corporate education program for The Moth, a nonprofit organization based in New York City dedicated to the art and craft of storytelling. She also founded the Nantucket Comedy Festival.

Charles Barber Remembered

ongtime Historical Society member Charles Finch Barber recently passed away on September 30, 2012 at age 95. Only days before, Mr. Barber made a generous contribution of \$25,000 in support of the Historical Society's Library and Archives.

Mr. Barber had a distinguished life and career. He graduated from Northwestern University, Harvard Law School and Oxford University. He was a Rhodes Scholar, served in the U.S. Navy during World War II, was former chairman of ASARCO and past director of the New York Stock Exchange. He was married for 62 years to Lois Helen LaCroix and is survived by four children: Brad Barber, Ann Barber, Robin Barber and Elizabeth Siegler.
