reenwich Voices is not your average exhibition. Beginning in October 2014, conceptual artists and guest curators Karina Aguilera Skvirsky and Liselot van der Heijden sought interviews with residents of all ages and walks of life in public and private spaces all over town. The goal was twofold: to record how residents describe life in Greenwich and to ultimately create an oral portrait of the town and its residents at a specific time and place in history.

At an exclusive members' preview, guests were treated to a special interview with curator Liselot van der Heijden, who described the process of creating the exhibition. Guests heard snippets from some of the fascinating interviews and then convened in the Storehouse Gallery to hear longer recordings and to view vintage film clips depicting iconic scenes from our beloved town.

Greenwich Voices is a true multimedia departure for the Historical Society. The project is a terrific example of how history is not necessarily always about the "big" events.

Depictions of daily life provide context and have the power to shape the way future generations examine and interpret Greenwich history. All of the recordings, including those not used for the exhibition, will be saved in our Library and Archives. *Greenwich Voices* will serve as a unique gift to future residents when the town celebrates its 400th birthday in 2040.

The program, begun six years ago, arranges for working artists and educators to conduct classroom workshops at the school to further explore topics touched upon during site visits. It exposes students to the enjoyment and creation of art, while building a foundation for lifelong learning and appreciation of local history.

On June 9, proud students shared the results of their studies with their families and school officials, exhibiting class quilts and self-portraits and leading tours of Bush-Holley House. The delightful results reflect vivid impressions of Bush-Holley Historic Site in fresh and insightful ways and are a gratifying testament to the value of this program.

Greenwich Historical Society Plaques Five Landmark Properties

his year's Landmark Recognition Program, graciously chaired by Robin Kencel, recognized five historic properties for their contribution to the unique architectural landscape of our town.

Accepting were homeowner Carol Burns for the Richard E. Brush House in the newly created River Road-Mead Avenue Historic District; Friends of French Farm president Nate Allen and property manager Jacek Nidzgorski for French Farm, Greenwich's first Designated Local Historic Property; Architect Andre Tchelistcheff for Chateau Paterno (the former Hirshhorn Estate) on behalf of homeowners Tommy and Dee Hilfiger; and State Senator Scott Frantz and Riverside Association president Roseann Benedict for the Riverside Avenue Bridge. Peter Malkin accepted for the restoration of the Historic Greenwich Post Office, now home to Restoration Hardware. Earlier in April, Mr. Malkin also received an Award of Merit from the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation for his efforts to save the historic and architecturally significant post office.

All recipients were presented with plaques and customized books about their properties. The books were written and designed by former Landmark Recognition chairman Jack Morris and committee member Joel Dawson, with photographs by Michael Biondo.

We were especially honored to welcome Stephanie Meeks, president and CEO of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, who gave the keynote speech in which she covered research done by the Trust concerning future trends in preservation.
