GREENWICH CHOICES

50 OBJECTS That ILLUSTRATE Our HISTORY



very town has a story to tell, and Greenwich's is 375 fascinating years old. Greenwich Choices: 50 Objects That Illustrate Our History explores defining moments in the town's growth and development through objects drawn from our collections. A shirt worn by Obadiah Mead, shot by a loyalist "cowboy," connects visitors with the American Revolution. A bill of sale for a three-year-old slave boy containing an emancipation clause speaks to changing attitudes toward slavery. Records from local manufacturers tell a tale of early entrepreneurs and opportunities for immigrant workers. A congresswoman's scrapbooks on the construction of the Merritt Parkway chronicle

changes that altered both the landscape and the movements of town residents.

All 50 objects reflect transformational moments in Greenwich's social, economic, industrial, political or artistic stories and symbolize choices made by generations of residents that shaped today's community. Curated by Karen Frederick, the exhibition also features responses to the objects by local high school students.

84th Annual Meeting and William C. Crooks Distinguished Lecture by Nathaniel Philbrick




Nathaniel Philbrick

he Cape Cod Times has written, "No one can tell you about the history you thought you knew quite like Nathaniel Philbrick." We heartily agree. The Historical Society is thrilled to host celebrated author and historian Nathaniel Philbrick at our annual meeting. Philbrick's lecture will focus on Bunker Hill:

A City, a Siege, a Revolution, and he will talk about how it inspired him to further explore issues covered in Mayflower, his account of King Philip's War—events that laid the groundwork for what would happen in Boston and throughout Massachusetts during the early stages of the American Revolution.

Philbrick is a long-time Nantucket resident, champion sailor, graduate of Brown University and a Duke Fellow with a masters' in American Literature. Among his impressive oeuvre of bestsellers are



Away Off Shore, Abram's Eyes, In the Heart of the Sea (currently the basis of a forthcoming film by director Ron Howard), Sea of Glory, Last Stand and his latest, Bunker Hill: A City, a Siege, a Revolution. He has written for Vanity Fair, The New York Times Book Review, The Wall Street Journal, The Los Angeles Times and The Boston Globe. He has appeared on the Today Show, the Morning Show, Dateline, PBS's American Experience, CSPAN and NPR. Don't miss this evening with one of America's pre-eminent historians.

Fall Festival: A Revolutionary Concept

n celebration of the town's 375th anniversary, this year's Fall Festival will focus on early Greenwich history. Reenactors from the Fifth Connecticut Regiment will demonstrate camp life at the time of the American Revolution and march, fire muskets and display uniforms, flags, crafts and weapons from the period.

Visitors may take a hayride along historic Strickland Road; enjoy a special family-friendly, early history tour of Bush-Holley House linked to the Fifth Connecticut Regiment; visit the exhibition *Greenwich Choices* and try their hands at Colonial-inspired crafts. They may also compete in the annual

scarecrow-making competition. Registration fee for the competition (in addition to the entrance fee) is \$10 for members and \$15 for nonmembers and includes armature ("the bones"), hay for stuffing, twine and a burlap sack for the head. Please enroll in advance for Scarecrow Competition.

Susan Larkin to Lead Tour of Bush-Holley House Art Collection

Bush-Holley House has many a tale to tell but none more colorful than the story of the Cos Cob art colony and its influence on the American art scene in the late

19th and early 20th centuries. Join us as art historian Susan Larkin takes us on a special art tour of the Greenwich Historical Society's collection with a focus on the pieces currently on view in Bush-Holley House—many created when Cos Cob was a bohemian hub for artistic and intellectual exchange. Leading visitors through the Holley Boarding House period rooms, Larkin will discuss how the confluence of individuals, the surrounding landscape and the ambience created by the Holley family were instrumental in ushering in a new era in American art.

Susan G. Larkin is an independent art historian and curator who has published and lectured widely on American art. She is the author of *The Cos Cob Art Colony: Impression*

ists on the Connecticut Shore and most recently curated the exhibition In a Good Light: The Artist's Studio in Cos Cob for the Greenwich Historical Society.



Women's Roles in Traditional Nigerian Folklore and Their Contemporary Impact

chronicling a Nigerian
woman's immigrant
experience in America.

As part of the town-wide program, guest speaker Nigerian

Princess Omaa Adaobi Ume-Ezeoke will share stories that reflect traditional Igbo worldviews on the roles of women in the contexts of family, marriage and work. The program will include a discussion that moves understanding of these roles into the contemporary environment of Adichie's *Americanah*.

The speaker is a visual and performing artist, as well as a storyteller of Igbo folktales. Her experiences from the 1967-70 Nigeria-Biafra civil war constitute an important influence on her work. She contributed to the reader *Pearls of Wisdom* and co-curated the

exhibition *Producing Histories: African Art at the Housatonic Museum of Art.* Ume-Ezeoke is the founding president of the Igbo Women's Association of Bridgeport.


