The Garden Club of America's Zone Historic Preservation Commendation



e're thrilled to announce that the Greenwich Historical Society is the recipient of The Garden Club of America's Zone Historic Preservation Commendation, recognizing the sustained preservation of the National Historic Landmark Bush-Holley House site and restoration of the American Impressionist art colony gardens. We are

supported by the vision, hard work and dedication of Hortulus and the Greenwich Garden Club, and our own Green Team volunteers, board and staff.

Hortulus's partnership with the Greenwich Historical Society includes the renovation of the Bush-Holley House heirloom vegetable gardens, the recent restoration of the 120– year–old grape arbor and the reestablishment of Elmer and Constant Holley MacRae's historic flower garden that inspired many paintings by American Impressionist artists at the Cos Cob art colony. The Greenwich Garden Club established the Tavern Garden near the restored Toby's Tavern to reflect the Colonial Revival interests of the art colony era. The Tavern Garden, now home to our Tavern Garden Markets, is cultivated with climbing vines, historic daffodil bulbs, lilies, hydrangeas and appropriate perennials and annuals.

Elizabeth Darling presided at a ceremony to present the award in person ahead of the April 14th virtual event. Accepting the award were Board Chair Haley Elmlinger; Historical Society Trustees Bea Crumbine, Davidde Strackbein and Debbie Reynolds; Peter J. Tesei, Former First Selectman for the Town of Greenwich; Jane Dunn, past president of the Greenwich Garden Club; Hortulus President Nanny Cannon; and Historical Society Executive Director Debra Mecky and Director of Operations Michele Couture.

Spotlight on the Archives

Beautiful Work features original objects, artworks and archival material drawn primarily from the collection of the Greenwich Historical Society. In preparation and research for the exhibition, Curator Maggie Dimock worked with Curator of Archives Christopher Shields, and was supported and guided by discoveries made by Project Archivist Leslie Albamonte and Digitization Associate Kelsie Dalton, whose work in the collections unearthed several photographs and architectural records that shaped the scope of the exhibit.

Beautiful Work: The Art of Greenwich Gardens and Landscapes is now on view in the Greenwich Historical Society's Frank Family Foundation Gallery. Beautiful Work takes a historical approach to the themes of gardening, landscape design and horticulture in Greenwich with an innovative display of agricultural tools, landscape design drawings, photographs, artworks and other ephemera. Visitors to the exhibition will encounter a selection of locally collected 19th-century dried botanical specimens, floral paintings and garden furniture, and projected images of Greenwich gardens from the early 20th century, taken from hand-tinted glass lantern slides.

Complement your visit to the exhibition with a guided **Outdoor Historic Site and Landscape Tour**, offering an introduction to the history of the Bush and Holley families, their gardens and the surrounding neighborhood of Cos Cob's Lower Landing. Guided Site and Landscape Tours are offered Saturdays and Sundays at 2:00 p.m. (weather permitting).

Beautiful Work will be on view through September 5, 2021.

Come explore Connecticut's colonial history and Cos Cob's art colony through games, crafts and hands-on fun. Creative minds will spend time in our historic gardens and (air-conditioned!) barn, exploring their surroundings using art, science and old-fashioned ingenuity under the guidance of professional educators and artists. Space is limited! Early bird pricing is available.

History Week

Campers will be transported back in time to Greenwich's colonial era. They will learn about important historical events as well as skills necessary for living in a time without electricity and running water. Campers will have the opportunity to weave, cook and create colonial art. They will also learn about the importance of a personal garden and about the plants that could be grown for cooking, medicine and creating natural pigments.

Art Week

Campers will learn about the Cos Cob art colony and the avant-garde work of the Impressionist artists who stayed at the Bush–Holley House. Led by Master Painter Dmitri Wright, campers will have the opportunity to learn about color, light and form as they create their own unique works of art. Activities include painting *en plein air*, pottery and theater.
