# SPORTS!

MORE THAN JUST A GAME MARCH 8 - SEPTEMBER 3, 2023



On March 8 the Greenwich Historical Society welcomed visitors to our current exhibition, *Sports! More Than Just a Game*, presenting an inclusive and insightful history of athletics, sports culture and celebrated athletes in Greenwich and surrounding communities. The exhibition, supported in part by grants from Connecticut Humanities and First Republic Bank, tells a fuller history of local athletes, teams and competitions with artifacts and memorabilia on view from museum and private collections.

Exhibition curator **Kathleen Craughwell–Varda** reflects on the process of researching and developing the exhibition and the discoveries and relationships made along the way.

ne of the benefits of curating this exhibit has been connecting with people from Greenwich whose personal stories are tied to both the community and the sports world.

Major League Baseball pitcher Tom Seaver (1944–2020), who was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1992 for his illustrious career largely spent with the New York Mets, was a native of California but selected Greenwich as home for his young family in 1970. Although Seaver and his wife returned to his home state following their daughter's graduation from Greenwich High School in the late

1990s, their Connecticut hometown still evokes fond memories for the family. Supportive of this exhibition from its inception, Seaver's daughter,

Sarah Seaver Zaske, has generously helped facilitate the loan of personal family mementos and major awards that reflect her father's storied career – including one of Seaver's three Cy Young Award plaques and his MLB Rookie of the Year Award, bestowed during his first season with the Mets in 1967. In our conversations we not only discussed Seaver's life and career, but also the people of Greenwich and other resident—athletes who were among the family's circle of friends and part of Sarah's fond memories of living here.

Sherry Young, mother of San Francisco 49ers quarterback, Super Bowl MVP and National Football League Hall of Famer Steve Young, a 1980 graduate of Greenwich High School, has shared stories that give special meaning to each item featured in the exhibition. The artifacts and mementos reflect her son's time playing youth football, his tenure as quarterback for the Greenwich High School football team and his professional football career. Each item is imbued with memories of Greenwich, the families whose sons played football with Steve, and Sherry Young's own realization that her son was destined for greatness.

Perhaps the most rewarding conversations I've had are with the living descendants of some of Greenwich's sports stars from decades past whose legacies have become memories over time. I was especially touched speaking with family members of champion diver and Greenwich resident Helen Meany (1904–1991). Helen Meany became the first American female diver to compete in three Olympic games and won the gold medal in the three–meter springboard competition in 1928. The items her family has preserved from her

competition days, including two silver cup trophies and a hand-colored gilded Olympic Certificate awarded at the time of her gold

medal performance in the 1928 Amsterdam Olympics, demonstrate how deeply athletic achievements are tied to our sense of family history and pride.

## League of Women Voters Donates Historical Records to Archives

The donated trove spans a century, beginning with handwritten meeting minutes from October 1921, shortly after the passage of the 19th Amendment granting women the right to vote – an especially historic period with significant consequences for society. There are scrapbook albums, photos, videotapes and information on past League presidents, including many larger–than–life personalities who helped secure women's voting rights in our country.

"LWV Greenwich's historical record has been saved and passed down volunteer to volunteer for 100 years," noted LWV Greenwich President Sandy Waters. "This is a remarkable accomplishment and a testament to the value our leadership places upon our mission. We are pleased that our partnership with the Historical Society will protect our historical past for the public to understand and read for themselves."

"This donation enables us to continue to showcase and preserve the contributions of the League, which began with our exhibition *An Unfinished Revolution: The Woman's Suffrage Centennial* in 2021," said Historical Society's Executive Director and CEO Debra Mecky. "Equally important, it helps further our mission of telling a fuller and more inclusive history of Greenwich and working collaboratively to build awareness of its historic assets and their preservation."

Materials are now available to view by appointment by contacting Christopher Shields, Curator of Library and Archives. Once the records are fully processed, they will be accessible through a finding aid on the Greenwich Historical Society website.


