In the late spring of 1957, Chinese-born ceramic artist Katherine Choy (1927-1958) arrived in Port Chester, New York, with a goal of establishing the “Clay Art Center for Advanced Study in Ceramics and Sculpture,” later known as simply Clay Art Center. Choy was an accomplished artist of mounting national reputation who developed her unique approach to ceramic art as a student at Mills College in Oakland, California, and a graduate fellow at the Cranbrook Academy of Art in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. She had spent the previous five years as head ceramic instructor at Newcomb College in New Orleans.

With the support of friend and
 collaborator Henry Okamoto (1922-1988),
 a ceramic artist from Lodi, California, who
 beginning in the early 1950s was based in
 Cos Cob, Connecticut, Choy’s vision for
 Clay Art Center came to life as one of the
 first studio spaces dedicated solely to the
 study and practice of ceramic art in the
 United States.

Sadly, only a year after founding Clay
 Art Center, Choy died unexpectedly at
 the young age of 30. Okamoto remained

dedicated to keeping the Center running in fulfillment of her vision. Today, more than
 65 years later, Clay Art Center endures as a nationally known, vibrant nonprofit art
 center dedicated to the advancement and practice of
 ceramic art. Meanwhile, Choy’s boundary-pushing
 sculptural ceramic vessels are experiencing a
 resurgence in interest, and her ceramic pieces can be
 found in the collections of the Metropolitan Museum
 of Art, the Newark Museum of Art, and the Museum
 of Arts and Design.

In October the Greenwich Historical Society will
 present *Radical Pots & Cooperative Hands: Katherine
 Choy and Clay Art Center*. Featuring a wealth of ceramic
 pots and vessels on loan from Clay Art Center’s
 collections, many created by Choy in her final years,
 the exhibition will also present never-before seen
 historic photographs, letters, and other illuminating
 material from Clay Art Center’s archives that tell a poignant and captivating story of
 a group of young artists finding fertile ground for creative work in Port Chester and
 neighboring Greenwich, Connecticut.

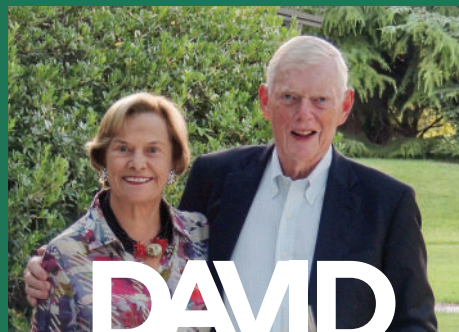

Treasures from the Museum Collection: Ceramics by Leon Volkmar

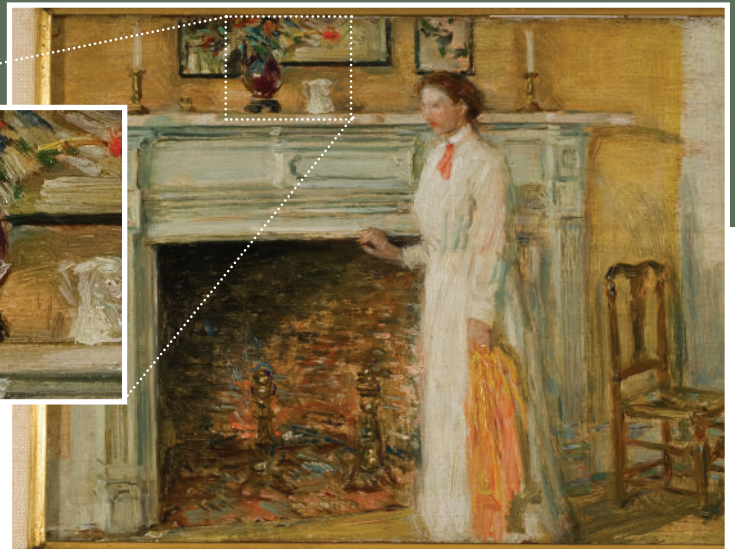
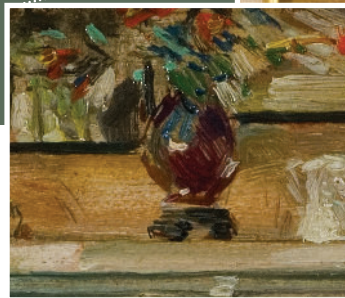
Coinciding with the exhibition *Radical Pots & Cooperative Hands: Katherine Choy and Clay Art Center*, beginning this fall visitors to the Greenwich Historical Society's Permanent Collections Gallery will be able to view a complementary installation of ceramic vessels by artist Leon Gambetta Volkmar (1879-1959).

Working out of Bedford, New York, at a pottery studio he named Durant Kilns, Volkmar produced artistic clay vessels with vibrant glaze surfaces inspired by ancient Egyptian and Persian wares. Volkmar was a friend of artist Elmer Livingston MacRae, and in the 1910s and '20s his distinctive vases could often be seen in the Bush-Holley House, forming the base for floral arrangements designed by Constant Holley MacRae.

Volkmar's distinctive vessels were frequently present in works by artists of the Cos Cob art colony. In the small oil painting *The Mantel Piece* (1912), now part of the Greenwich Historical Society Museum Collection, painter Childe Hassam depicted his wife, Maude Hassam, standing in the first-floor bedroom of the Bush-Holley House. A striking aubergine vase by Volkmar is visible on the fireplace mantel, holding an arrangement of orange flowers.

Good to Great Grant

We are the grateful recipient of a Good to Great 2.0 Grant of \$418,057 to fund critical environmental upgrades for the National Historic Landmark Bush-Holley House. Co-administered by the Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) and CT Humanities, the grant will support a comprehensive series of upgrades to the Bush-Holley House's climate control systems, ensuring the continued stewardship

of its historic furnishings and original artworks, which include original paintings, prints and drawings by nationally recognized American Impressionist artists such as Childe Hassam and Elmer Livingston MacRae, and bringing the visitor experience to a modern standard of comfort.

2023 Awardee: Allan Houston

In conjunction with our recent exhibition, *Sports! More Than Just a Game*, we will honor NBA legend Allan Houston with the History in the Making Award in recognition of his philanthropic contributions to Greenwich and beyond, and his commitment to ensuring a future that offers generations to come opportunities to make our world at large a better place. Houston, his wife Tamara and their seven children have been area residents for over two decades. He has supported Greenwich youth organizations such as the Boys and Girls Club and Kids in Crisis, whose services extend to surrounding



communities in Stamford and New York and across the country. A consummate athlete, Houston is a two-time NBA All-star with a 12-year playing tenure with the Detroit Pistons and New York Knicks and was a member of the gold-medal winning U.S. Men's Basketball team at the 2000 Summer Olympics. His impact extends beyond the court through

the Allan Houston Legacy Foundation and the FISLL Project, which serves underserved youth, families and communities nationwide through strategic partnerships, coaching clinics and fatherhood and family programming. Houston is the ninth recipient of the award, which was established in 2003 to recognize individuals from our community who are the history makers of our own time. Former awardees include Barbara and Ray Dalio, who will present this year's award, Indra Nooyi, Derek Boothby, Thomas Foley, Curt Welling, Marie and Charlene Von Saher and Lewis Lehrman.

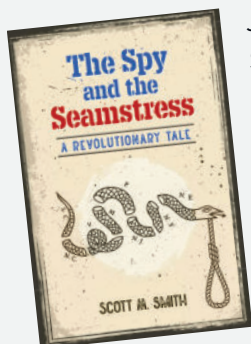

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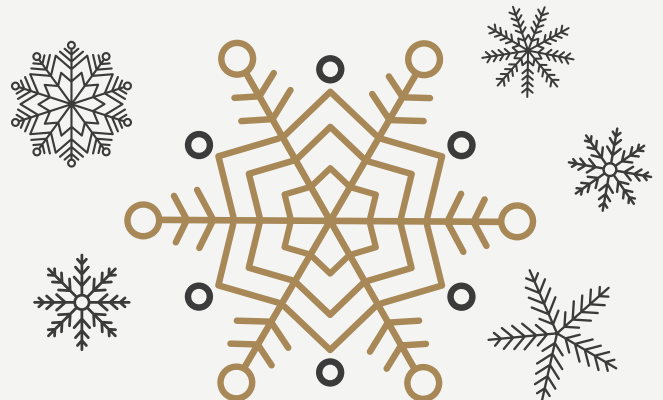
